FROM THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER

To the Resident of Scott Township:

This issue of Scott Topics is filled with upcoming events and information that is useful for every resident.

Recently, the Township is in the process of installing forty-seven LED Street Lights throughout the Township in coordination with Duquesne Light's LED Street Light Conversion Program. Over the past three years, we have installed more than twenty other LED Street lights in coordination with previous grant applications. We are planning to apply for thirty more in this upcoming grant round.

We have also installed a program in the Township called Civic Ready. It is a notification system for our residents to sign up for if they are interested. It notifies you of road closures, water main breaks, and other pertinent information for our residents. If you are interested in signing up for this free service, please go to our new web-site, www.scott-twp.com. Click on Notify me and follow the steps for new sign up.

We recently had a reevaluation completed by Standard and Poor's Global ratings and because of the strong financial position, they have raised our bond rating from an A+ to a AA-. Their outlook on our township is "stable". In their rating event notice, they stated, "the rating action reflects our view of the Township's strengthened financial position, reflected strong budgetary performance..." They also stated that we have maintained a history of structural balance.

The Township was again awarded Banner Community status in 2019 thru the Allegheny League of Municipalities. Scott Township earned this designation by modeling ourselves as a community committed to sustainable practices, intergovernmental cooperation, sound fiscal management and proactive communications to engage community stakeholders.

This issue of the Scott Township News will focus on upcoming events, usual seasonal issues, as well as provide you with some useful information regarding the most recent legislation of general interest to our Scott Township residents. I hope this issue of the newsletter is both informative and helpful to you.

Dear Second Ward residents,

Another new year, a new decade and I am pleased to inform you that the township is on very firm financial footing. Dave Calabria Commissioner of the fourth ward is the newly elected president of the board, he is a very fair hard working and a honorable man. Dave will lead the township commissioners with integrity and dignity. We have a new code and enforcement officer, Mr. Mark Mox and he is proving to be a real positive asset for the township he has 30 years experience as an architect and was a partner in a very prestigious engineering firm, He is also the president of the planning commission. We also have a new director of public services Mr. Thomas Kelley who has many years of experiences as administrative staff for Allegheny County and Mount Lebanon Township in various public works leadership positions. Both of these gentlemen will bring a new era of professionalism to the Township. We are now into our third year of a new policy of paving the worst roads in the township and should complete the list next year. The township is spending close to a million dollars a year so that our roads are brought up to higher standards. We also hired Kelli Watson and Stephanie McFerron as Park Directors they are certified educators and are excited to implement new programs in our parks. Ms. Watson is also the new pool director and last year

did a exemplary job. All the employees mentioned above are under the direction of Denise Fitzgerald the township manager who is doing a exemplary job. This year we have budgeted more funds to improve the Little League fields that are scheduled to have the playing surfaces repaired and the fencing improved as well as other various projects that were recommended by their new president Mike Giammatteo and his board (Remember to sign up your son or daughter to play ball). As always our public works department does a fantastic job maintaining our roads and sewers and everyone knows we have the cleanest roads during snow storms making Scott Township a safe place to get around in the winter months.

Our police Chief James Secreet is retiring this year but is staying on as the Police Superintendent and Matt Posiadly is being considered for appointment to acting police chief. During the transition Chief Secreet will be his mentor. Chief Secreet will be missed but we are fortunate that he will stay on sharing his knowledge so that the smoothest transition occurs.

The next task that must be under taken is improvement to the sanitary and storm sewers. The sewers have not been neglected but the federal government has many new higher standards that every city, municipality, and township must meet. These improvements are not cheap and will require the township to sharpen their pencils to pay for these required repairs. Last year we raised the sewer user fees but we dropped the real estate tax rate so that the cost of these improvements is shared by all water consumers. Scott Township still has the absolutely lowest sanitary sewer user fees in the area. Not every decision on repairing and funding sewer repairs are going to be popular but I can tell you it is not as unpopular as waking up with a basement full of raw sewage.

In 2018 the board voted to apply for a grant to study the fire departments and how the township can better serve their needs so they can continue their terrific services. This audit is scheduled to be completed this calendar year.

Please attend the township meetings, a huge percentage of your tax dollars are allocated to local governments. Many residents will pay more in county, school, and township taxes than they do federal taxes and have no idea what their tax dollars are being spent on or if they are utilized in effective positive ways.

A new year has arrived and we look forward to a healthy and prosperous new one. I am happy to report that the new road paving program has been working well and we will continue to monitor the resurfacing of roads this coming season. We were able to repair Greenbriar Drive alley (at no cost to the Township) for those residents who have endured unsafe conditions for so long. The bridge in East Carnegie was dedicated and named 'The Purple Heart Bridge' and was placed on the National Purple Heart Registry. I hope this year is a successful one and, as always, welcome your suggestions and comments.

FRANK BRUCKNER *7th Ward*

Thank you for your support during the past year. I am truly honored to represent the 7th Ward.

2019 was also my second year of a two-year term as the President of the Scott Township Board of Commissioners.

While performing in both capacities I again tried to be fiscally conservative and to help identify cost savings and more efficient methods of operation.

Whenever feasible we advertised for bids to identify cost savings and ensure a competitive, transparent bid process. All bids are opened at Township meetings, and we continue to look for additional ways to get the best price for contracted and/or professional services.

In 2019, Scott Township again received the Banner Community Award given by the Allegheny League of Municipalities (ALOM). This award recognizes communities that demonstrate a dedication to professional development, prudent fiscal management, transparency, accountability, and proactive communications.

In 2019, I was thankful to my colleagues for granting my request to fund the 1st Glass Recycling Event in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Resources Council. The PRC advised us that the event was a success and they estimated that approximately (300) people attended the event. In the end, WE collected 4.95 tons of glass for recycling! The PRC advised us that both statistics were Great numbers - right on average with other PRC Collection Events. That is very impressive, considering that most other communities did not see those kinds of numbers until their 2nd or 3rd glass pop-up with the PRC. Additionally, during this event, We partnered with Allegheny County Sheriff Bill Mullen's Office Deputy Sheriff Joe Cirigilano on project D.U.M.P. (Disposal of Unused/expired Medications properly) in which approximately 10lbs of unwanted Rx/Medical Waste was collected.

In 2019 I was able to obtain a grant from Allegheny County District Attorney Stephen Zappala which helped to fund

a project to secure the upstairs offices of our Municipal Building.

In 2019, as Chairman of the Public Relations Committee We issued the following Proclamations: The Scott Police Department for Law Enforcement Appreciation Day, The Scott Township Public Library (STPL) for National Library Week, Scott Township Resident Bethany Edwards on her 1st published book, The Chartiers Valley School District Girls Basketball Team and Coach Tim McConnell for an undefeated Season culminating with a PIAA Class 5A State Title, The Scott Township Conservancy's 30 year Anniversary, The naming of Scott Township's Idelwood Bridge "A Purple Heart Bridge", Scott Township resident Jordan Cavey for completing his Eagle Scout Project, Scott Township resident and Centenarian Anna E. Morris, Scott Township resident Sean McDowell for bringing over 4 decades of Rock N' Roll to Pittsburgh area residents.

In 2019, We re-applied for a grant through the Duquesne Light Pilot Program which enabled the conversion of fifteen (15) additional Sodium Street Lights to LED Cobra Head Street Lights within the 7th Ward.

As in years past, the annual Orchard Spring Halloween festival and parade took place and the event was another success. My wife Jeanette and I were again honored to participate as costume judges. The success was due in large part to planning committee members; Monica Baranowski, Colleen Hough, Rachel Schwartzmiller, Mary Lou Blasko, and Melody Johnson. The event raised \$400.00 through the generous donations of the Orchard Spring Community. All proceeds were donated to the Scott Township Public Library (STPL).

In 2019, as your elected Official, I attended and participated in: The Allegheny League of Municipalities (ALOM) Annual Spring Conference and the (ALOM) Legislative Conference, State Representative Dan Millers Community Round Table Discussion which we were honored to host, A Meet & Greet with former Scott Township resident U.S. Naval Commander Jason Deichler, The Cochran Hall Annual Cookout, The Scott Township Annual Octoberfest, The Orchard Spring Halloween Festival and Parade, The Scott Township Annual E-Waste Recycling Event, The 1st Scott Township Glass Recycling Event, The Scott Township Annual Toys for Tots Campaign, The Scott Township Annual Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony, The Cochran Hall Christmas Luncheon, collaborated with County Councilman Catena on having the county conduct a creek study along Hope Hollow and several Downsizing for Seniors Seminars.

It's there to remind our citizens and the Officers of the Scott Township Police Department that our goal is to help people. It says we will be there in your time of need. It says we'll do our best to solve your problems. Remember, Police Officers are human beings, we may not always respond the way you want us to, or the way you expect. But we care, we will help and we will be there for you...

THAT'S OUR PROMISE

The department's sworn staff includes its Chief of Police, 4 Sergeants, 20 Patrol Officers, and 1 Detective. The Scott Township Police Department respond to all 9-1-1 emergency calls as well as non-emergency police calls 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, and logs approximately 7,500 calls for service annually.



If you're certain that you have a non-emergency and just need information, call 412.279.6911. Calling this number will connect you to a police officer in your area.

Please keep in mind that it is a violation to park on the sidewalks. In the Glendale area there are some streets that we are more lenient on due to the narrow street widths. On these streets we do permit 2 vehicle wheels to be on the sidewalk but if the sidewalk is blocked to the point that it inhibits pedestrian traffic, the vehicle will be ticketed and/or towed. Parking on the sidewalk on Carothers is not permitted.



Please No Dogs Allowed in Our Public Parks

On September 14, 1971 the Township of Scott passed an Ordinance (#823), prohibiting the walking of dogs or the bringing of dogs into the Township Parks and Parklets.

CODE ENFORCEMENT IS VITAL TO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Code Enforcement – A Code Enforcement Officer is a sworn or non-sworn inspector, officer or investigator, whose primary duties are the prevention, detection, investigation, and enforcement of violations of laws regulating public nuisance, public health safety, and welfare, business activities and consumer protection, building standards, land-use, or municipal affairs. Code Enforcement is a function local governments perform that citizens consider important for accomplishing community goals, such as protecting property values and the environment.

When used in the context of community development, the term pertains to property upkeep and standards for new construction. Bringing property owners into compliance with the law can be an important part of maintaining the appearance, functioning, and property values of a neighborhood.



Spring cleaning is right around the corner; please keep in mind that it is unlawful to have unsightly debris or junk in your yard or around your property. It is also illegal to have an unregistered or uninspected vehicle(s) on your property.

Haul away bags or dumpsters can be placed on your property for clean up or a construction project for a maximum of **10 days**. PODS are a convenient way to pack your belongings for storage elsewhere. You cannot use trailers for storage on your property.

Rental Property Inspections

Under PA Act 21, effective June 1, 2015 owners of all rental properties will be required to install carbon monoxide detectors and obtain a rental inspection. Rental life safety inspections are required each time a new tenant moves in.



Why do I need a Building Permit

Building permits are mainly about safety. By enforcing construction standards, they give you and the other occupants of the building the best chance to avoid fire, structural failure or something as simple as a child getting his head caught between stair posts. If you decide to move, the permit process also protects future owners.

When do I need a Building/Zoning Permit?

If you are making changes to your houses' structure, plumbing, or electrical wiring, you will need to obtain a building/zoning permit. Permits are also required to install, modify, or make structural repairs to a deck, fence, swimming pool, hot tub, shed or garage. The best way to find out whether or not a permit is required is to call your Code Enforcement/Building Department at (412) 276-5300.

Building permits **MUST** be obtained **30 days** prior to the project start date and a completed Scott Township Verification of Tax Payments form **MUST** also be included in the application.

PEST ALERTS

Outdoor Recommendations:

- Avoid having a bird feeder.
- Keep outdoor grills and cooking areas clean.
- Keep firewood off the ground and as far away from structures as possible.
- Maintain at least a 2-foot space between bushes and shrubs.

Indoor Recommendations:

- Opt for garbage bins and compost containers with a top that seals tightly.
- Do not leave pet food or water out overnight.
- Repair leaky pipes.
- Maintain attic, crawl spaces, and cabinets.

Bower Hill VFD is one of 3 Fire Departments (Glendale and East Carnegie are the other departments serving Scott Township) that serve the over 17,000 Scott Township residents and businesses.

Bower Hill is a completely volunteer fire department with approximately 40 members who respond to calls for assistance from the residents and businesses, regardless the time of day.

Here are some statistics about the calendar year 2019 for Bower Hill VFD

1. 284 calls requesting assistance these include fires, car crashes, odor investigations and other requests. These requests average 8 members per call with most calls lasting about 2 hours so that means we volunteered 4,544 hours.
2. 1,449 total hours of training. This total includes classes taken by members outside of our normal Wednesday evening in house training.
3. 6,016 hours is the total of hours donated to the Scott Township residents and businesses by our volunteers
4. These 6,016 hours do not include the countless hours spent providing public service programs for the residents and businesses of Bower Hill. These include "Touch a Truck" events for schools, day care centers, block parties etc. annually. We also participate in the Octoberfest at Scott Park and the Annual Christmas Tree lighting with Santa arriving.

EQUIPMENT UPGRADES

FIRE ENGINE: We recently took delivery on our new 2019 Precision Compressed Air Foam Mini Pumper. This engine will be better able to navigate the narrower streets within the Township.

OTHER EQUIPMENT: We are continually upgrading our equipment to the standards set by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to be sure that our responding members are wearing/using the appropriate and necessary clothing/equipment. Did you know that it costs about \$11,000.00 to properly outfit a firefighter, including the breathing apparatus that they wear? The money to cover some of this equipment is received from grants and the residents and businesses by their support with the Bower Hill VFD membership drive and their donations.

WANT TO HELP US OUT? - Here are some ways that you can support Bower Hill Volunteer Fire Department so that we can continue to provide fire service to the residents and businesses of Scott Township.

3. **AMBULANCE MEMBERSHIP** - By becoming a member of Bower Hill you can receive medically necessary ambulance transports and we will accept what your insurance carrier pays and not bill you for the balance of the ambulance transport. We provide ambulance services and transport whether you are or are not a member of Bower Hill. You are treated as a member of Bower Hill VFD (STEMS ambulance)

4. **DEPARTMENT MEMBERSHIP** - Become a member! We have several positions that you might be able to fill. Not everyone in our department is an interior firefighter. Several members provide help on the exterior of the fire ground as well. Helping with many tasks involved in fighting a fire or at an accident scene. If you would like to talk to someone about joining please call 412-221-3497

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS:

1. **PHONE CALLS** - Bower Hill Volunteer Fire Department DOES NOT make any phone calls to residents asking for financial support. Our only contact is by the mailings that we send in October and January regarding our membership program.
2. **HOUSE NUMBERS** - Check your house numbers and see if they are visible from the curb both night and day. This is vitally important in getting the right services to you when needed.
3. **SMOKE ALARMS AND CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS** - Please remember to change the batteries in both your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors when you change your clocks. This will insure working alarms in your home. It is recommended that you replace your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors every 7 to 10 years.

The mission of the Department of Public Works is to provide the residents of Scott Township with safe and well maintained transportation, recreation, sanitation and storm water infrastructures. Our maintenance services are directed towards enhancing and improving the conditions of our roads, bridges, park facilities, public buildings, and sewage conveyance systems. The department's services are augmented through contracts to repair or replace deteriorated or malfunctioning sewage assets, and an annual roadway paving project. In the spring and summer our efforts are concentrated on road and parks maintenance activities as well as catch basin and sewer line cleaning. In the spring and fall the department provides community wide leaf and branch pickup programs. In the winter the department's assets are directed towards snow and ice removal from Township streets. Currently we are working with the Township Engineer to implement a geographical information system to assist us in managing our human, material and infrastructure assets.

In the coming months the Township of Scott will provide an outline on the website for the 2020 Roadway Improvements Projects. When the construction season starts please go to the website for updates.

Snow Removal: In accordance with Ordinance #1486-01, residents are reminded that it is an offense to deposit snow or ice on a roadway. Snow pushed or blown onto a road creates a hazard to both vehicles and snow removal equipment and can interfere with water flow in ditches.

- Keep parked cars off the street during snowfalls. Snow removal crews need to be able to remove snow from the entire roadway.
- Be patient during a heavy snowfall. The snow removal plan prioritizes major roads and streets as well as hazardous intersections. The crews will clear your street as quickly as possible.
- If you notice a hazardous section of Township road, please report it to the Police Department or the Township Administration Office.

PRIVATE SEWER LATERAL ALERT

At a recent Sewer Committee meeting, the Committee had a preliminary informational discussion regarding the necessity to address defective private laterals that extend from your home to the township's main sanitary line.

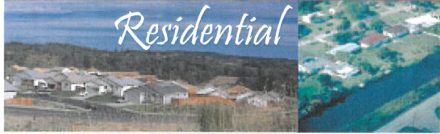
Defective private laterals have been found to contribute a significant amount of surface and ground water into the township's sewer system. The entrance of ground and surface water into the Township's sewer system causes manhole overflows and basement flooding. Both of which must be eliminated under current state and federal regulations.

Although no plan has been adopted, an initial suggestion requires individual homeowners pay to have their private laterals examined with a camera at the time of a sale, for example. The issue is serious and does require more research and discussion. NO DECISION HAS BEEN MADE YET. In the future the Board will be having public meetings to make the public aware of this issue, possible solutions and the cost of those solutions. Your input will be important. We will be providing notices of these meetings on our website, Township Facebook page and the marquee near the Municipal Building. Please watch for these notices and attend so you can be heard on this important issue. Your input is needed.

Stormwater Pollution Solutions

Residential



Recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, and used motor oil and other auto fluids.

Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains.

Lawn care

Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.



- ◆ Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- ◆ Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- ◆ Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- ◆ Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.

Septic systems

Leaking and poorly maintained septic systems release nutrients and pathogens (bacteria and viruses) that can be picked up by stormwater and discharged into nearby waterbodies. Pathogens can cause public health problems and environmental concerns.



- ◆ Inspect your system every 3 years and pump your tank as necessary (every 3 to 5 years).
- ◆ Don't dispose of household hazardous waste in sinks or toilets.

Auto care

Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody.



- ◆ Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.
- ◆ Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Pet waste

Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters.



- ◆ When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterbodies.



Education is essential to changing people's behavior. Signs and markers near storm drains warn residents that pollutants entering the drains will be carried untreated into a local waterbody.

Residential landscaping

Permeable Pavement—Traditional concrete and asphalt don't allow water to soak into the ground. Instead these surfaces rely on storm drains to divert unwanted water. Permeable pavement systems allow rain and snowmelt to soak through, decreasing stormwater runoff.

Rain Barrels—You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquito-proof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.



Rain Gardens and Grassy Swales—Specially designed areas planted with native plants can provide natural places for



rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Rain from rooftop areas or paved areas can be diverted into these areas rather than into storm drains.

Vegetated Filter Strips—Filter strips are areas of native grass or plants created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks up as it flows across driveways and streets.



Commercial

Dirt, oil, and debris that collect in parking lots and paved areas can be washed into the storm sewer system and eventually enter local waterbodies.

- ◆ Sweep up litter and debris from sidewalks, driveways and parking lots, especially around storm drains.
- ◆ Cover grease storage and dumpsters and keep them clean to avoid leaks.
- ◆ Report any chemical spill to the local hazardous waste cleanup team. They'll know the best way to keep spills from harming the environment.

Erosion controls that aren't maintained can cause excessive amounts of sediment and debris to be carried into the stormwater system. Construction vehicles can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater and deposited into local waterbodies.

- ◆ Divert stormwater away from disturbed or exposed areas of the construction site.
- ◆ Install silt fences, vehicle mud removal areas, vegetative cover, and other sediment and erosion controls and properly maintain them, especially after rainstorms.
- ◆ Prevent soil erosion by minimizing disturbed areas during construction projects, and seed and mulch bare areas as soon as possible.



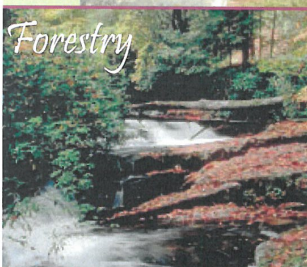
Construction

Agriculture

Lack of vegetation on streambanks can lead to erosion. Overgrazed pastures can also contribute excessive amounts of sediment to local waterbodies. Excess fertilizers and pesticides can poison aquatic animals and lead to destructive algae blooms. Livestock in streams can contaminate waterways with bacteria, making them unsafe for human contact.



- ◆ Keep livestock away from streambanks and provide them a water source away from waterbodies.
- ◆ Store and apply manure away from waterbodies and in accordance with a nutrient management plan.
- ◆ Vegetate riparian areas along waterways.
- ◆ Rotate animal grazing to prevent soil erosion in fields.
- ◆ Apply fertilizers and pesticides according to label instructions to save money and minimize pollution.

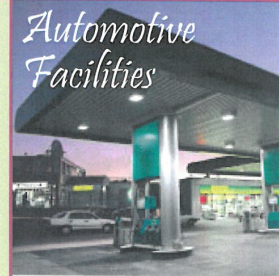


Forestry

Improperly managed logging operations can result in erosion and sedimentation.

- ◆ Conduct preharvest planning to prevent erosion and lower costs.
- ◆ Use logging methods and equipment that minimize soil disturbance.
- ◆ Plan and design skid trails, yard areas, and truck access roads to minimize stream crossings and avoid disturbing the forest floor.
- ◆ Construct stream crossings so that they minimize erosion and physical changes to streams.
- ◆ Expedite revegetation of cleared areas.

Automotive Facilities



Uncovered fueling stations allow spills to be washed into storm drains. Cars waiting to be repaired can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater.

- ◆ Clean up spills immediately and properly dispose of cleanup materials.
- ◆ Provide cover over fueling stations and design or retrofit facilities for spill containment.
- ◆ Properly maintain fleet vehicles to prevent oil, gas, and other discharges from being washed into local waterbodies.
- ◆ Install and maintain oil/water separators.

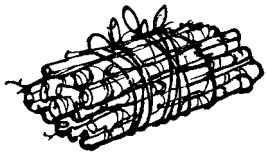

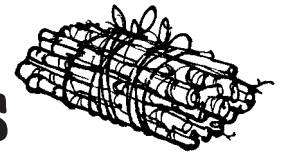

Dear Scott Township Resident,

Your community provides a comprehensive solid waste program designed to encourage recycling and waste reduction, reduce litter in our neighborhoods and ensure that waste is disposed of in an environmentally responsible manner. This guide includes various services that are available to residents. Waste Management pledges to provide the high-quality service residents expect and deserve.

REGULAR CURBSIDE COLLECTION: Trash will be collected once every week on **MONDAY**. Recycling will be collected every other week, please see the calendar to identify your collection week. Place material at the curb after 6 p.m. on the prior day or before 6 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.

SERVICE INQUIRES: Residents should contact Waste Management to report a missed pick up. A representative can be reached at 1-800-866-4460 or through live chat at www.wm.com. In the event of inclement weather, visit www.wm.com/alerts for service updates, delays and cancellations.

HOLIDAY SERVICE: Please reference the calendar for observed holidays.

GUIDELINES FOR COLLECTION: Residents should use their provided trash cart for collection.

- Garbage should be properly secured in your provided cart. Additional garbage beyond what fits in the cart can be placed in bags or additional cans alongside the cart for collection.
- Residents **must** fill their provided cart first before placing material outside of the cart.
- Residents are permitted 2 bulk items per week. Bulk items include chairs, tables, couches, lamps, etc.
- Additional carts can be purchased directly from Waste Management at a cost of \$85.00. To purchase an additional cart, residents should call Waste Management.
- Grass clippings and weeds should be in plastic bags.
- Furniture items, appliances, household goods and disassembled children's swing sets (cut to 4-foot length) will be accepted at curbside.
- Carpet should be rolled and tied in lengths not to exceed 48 inches so that one man can lift.
- Empty paint cans and dried paint are acceptable. Paint can be dried by air drying or soaking up with newspaper or kitty litter. Lids should be left off.

EXCLUDED ITEMS:

- Building material may be picked up for a fee by contacting WM at 800-866-4460
- Hazardous Household Waste and Electronic Waste (including paint, thinners, cleaners, pesticides/herbicides, etc.) – see PA Resources Council website for county events (www.prc.org)
- Automobile parts including wheel rims and tires
- Trees, branches and bushes
- Ashes from furnaces and fireplaces
- Stones and dirt

APPLIANCES CONTAINING REFRIGERANT: The contractor will collect such items as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, water coolers, etc.; however, the item must have a sticker certifying that the refrigerant has been removed. If it does not have the sticker, it will not be picked up. It is unlawful for the contractor to dispose of these items containing refrigerant. When purchasing a new appliance, have the store dispose of the old appliance to save the cost of having the refrigerant removed.

RECYCLING SERVICE: Residents will receive every other week curbside recycling collection. Please reference the calendar to identify your service week. Recyclables should be placed loose in your provided recycling cart. Material outside of the recycling cart will not be collected.

2020 Recycling Program Information

Great things happen when residents Recycle Right! By recycling everyday items like those shown below, raw materials, time, energy and money are saved. Plus, the recycled materials become new products - if you recycle an aluminum can today, it could be back on the shelf as a new one in 60 days - and the cycle continues. For programs to be successful, all participants must make an effort to follow good recycling practices.

- No plastic bags of any kind will be accepted. Please place material loose in your recycling bin or cart.
- Make sure you are only recycling plastic bottles, jugs and jars. Any other plastic shape must go in the trash.
- Glass is no longer accepted for recycling. Glass runs hard on our machines and can contaminate other good recyclables.
- Containers that held food should be rinsed free of food debris and liquid.
- Shredded paper is not accepted.

Please follow the Recycling Guidelines.

BATTLE AGAINST CONTAMINATION: Beginning in January, Waste Management will be leaving contaminated recycling at the curb. Residents will receive a tag on their recycle bin explaining the item(s) that do not belong and further instructions. **Please make sure you are recycling right!**

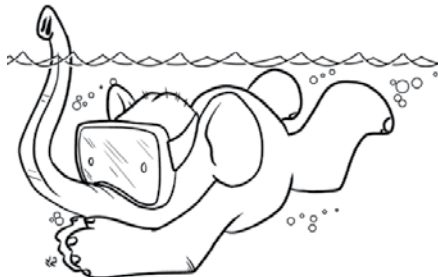

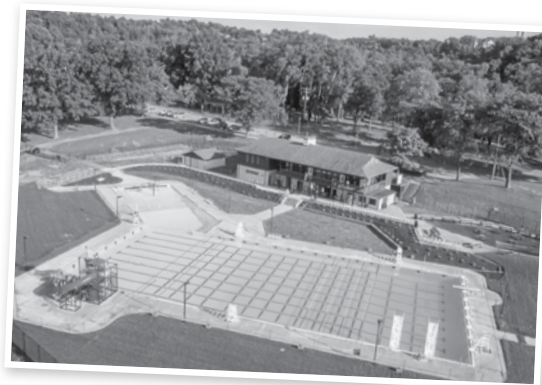

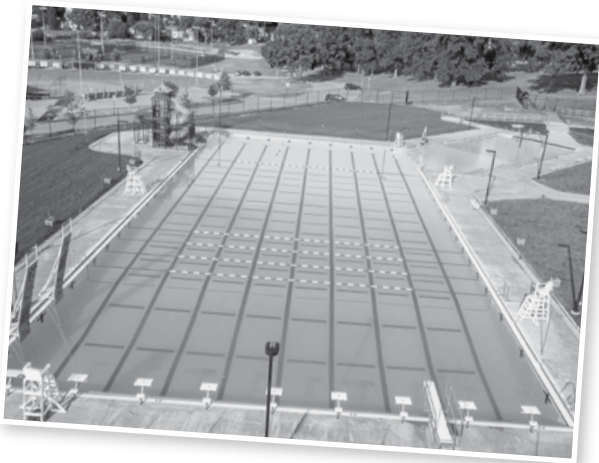
