FROM THE TOWNSHIP MANAGER

To the Residents of Scott Township:

This issue of Scott Topics is filled with upcoming events and information that is useful for every resident.

As we reflect on 2021, Scott Township adapted well to the challenges we faced during the Pandemic. Looking into 2022, we have several exciting projects ahead of us.

We recently received a GEDTF grant from the Commonwealth Finance Authority in the amount of \$100,000 to be used for the installation of new restrooms for Scott Park Pool Splash pad area. The splash pad and restrooms construction are anticipated to begin in the fall of this year so that our residents can enjoy the new amenities in the 2023 season.

The Township also received a generous \$1,000 donation from an anonymous donor from the Pittsburgh Foundation to be used for the pool this year as the donor stated that they were appreciative of the Township keeping the pool open and safe during the pandemic. Thank you to that generous donor.

The Township received ARPA funding that will be used for infrastructure improvements throughout the Township. The amount of this award was \$1.7 million dollars. Infrastructure

improvements for this funding include storm sewer projects and sanitary sewer projects.

The Township was again awarded Banner Community status in 2022 thru the Allegheny League of Municipalities. Scott Township earned this designation by modeling ourselves as a community committed to sustainable practices, intergovernmental cooperation, sound fiscal management and proactive communications to engage community stakeholders.

This issue of the Scott Township News will focus on upcoming events, usual seasonal issues, as well as provide you with some useful information regarding the most recent legislation of general interest to our Scott Township residents. I hope this issue of the newsletter is both informative and helpful to you.

If you're certain that you have a non-emergency and just need information, call 412.279.6911. Calling this number will connect you to a police officer in your area.

The Scott Township Police Department is comprised of 22 sworn officers and three civilian employees. This total includes the Chief of Police, five Sergeants, fourteen Patrol Officers, two Detectives, the police secretary and two part time school crossing guards. In addition to their regular duties, there are also special assignments within the police department. There is an officer assigned permanently to the Chartiers Valley Intermediate School as a School Resource Officer and one officer assigned to a traffic unit to focus on traffic concerns. Additionally, several officers have special assignments in cooperative roles with other departments through SHACOG. Two officers are assigned to the CIRT Team, one officer is assigned as an accident reconstructionist, and one officer is assigned to the ceremonial unit. These officers respond when the need for their expertise arises and for required training.

The police department is currently in the process of preparing for accreditation through the state of Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police. Accreditation would mean that the department's policies, procedures, and practices meet or exceed a set standard for operation as determined by the accrediting body. This is a lengthy process which is currently managed by Sgt. Walker and overseen by Chief Podsiadly.

The Chief of Police would also like to remind residents and visitors of several items that cause frequent cause for concern for the police department:

- Lock your vehicles!!! The police department has handled countless reports of unlocked vehicles entered and items stolen. Several vehicles were also stolen in this manner.
- Be cognizant of no overnight parking regulations. Officers will issue citations to those in violation. If a special need arises to park on the street overnight, contact the police department for permission.
- Parking in Glendale- the police department recognizes the challenges of parking in the Glendale neighborhood. When you must park on the sidewalk, only do so partially so as not to obstruct the passage of pedestrians or those using wheelchairs or similar mobility devices. That said, DO NOT PARK ON THE SIDEWALK AT ALL ON CAROTHERS AVENUE.
- Last, but certainly not least, IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING. The police department is here to serve the community that is near and dear to all of our hearts. Our community partners are the residents, business owners, and visitors who make Scott Township the wonderful place that it is. If you see something out of the ordinary, don't hesitate to call. Oftentimes, we find out after the fact that things were seen or heard but never reported, or not reported in a timely manner that could assist in an investigation.



Please leave your furry friends at home.

On September 14, 1971 the Township of Scott passed an Ordinance (#823), prohibiting the walking of dogs or the bringing of dogs into the Township Parks and Parklets.

CODE ENFORCEMENT IS VITAL TO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Did you know that Scott Township administers and enforces Pennsylvania's statewide building code, generally known as the Uniform Construction Code (UCC)? Enforcement of the UCC actually began in April 2004. As of Feb. 14, 2022 the applicable codes are the 2018 International Codes issued by the International Code Council, and the provisions amended by the UCC Review & Advisory Council.

So, what does this mean to you as a home owner wanting to make improvements to your property??????

Building permits are required for all improvements regulated by the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code.

Zoning Permits are required for all work regulated by the Scott Township Zoning Ordinance.



Spring cleaning is right around the corner; please keep in mind that it is unlawful to have unsightly debris or junk in your yard or around your property. It is also illegal to have an unregistered or uninspected vehicle(s) on your property.

Construction bags or dumpsters can be placed on your property for clean up or a construction project for a maximum of **3 days** or for a maximum of **30 days** when a building permit is issued. PODS are a convenient way to pack your belongings for storage elsewhere. PODS are also permitted to remain on your property for a maximum of **3 days** or for a maximum of **30 days** when a building permit is issued. You **cannot** use trailers for storage on your property.



Rental Property Inspections

Under PA Act 21, effective June 1, 2015 owners of all rental properties will be required to install carbon monoxide detectors and obtain a rental inspection. Rental life safety inspections are required each time a new tenant moves in and an annual Certi-

fication is required for all rental property in the Township which includes a fee of \$25.00 per dwelling unit.

WORK THAT REQUIRES A ZONING PERMIT, BUT NO BUILDING PERMIT

- One-story detached accessory structures used as tool and storage sheds, greenhouses, playhouse, detached private garage and similar uses, provided the floor area does not exceed 1000 square feet and they are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Retaining walls 4'-0" or less in height, measured from the lowest level of grade to the top of the wall, unless supporting a surcharge (such as, but not limited to, a slope, driveway, patio or swimming pool) or impounding Class I, II or IIIA liquids.
- Sidewalks, parking pads, patios, and driveways not more than 30 inches above adjacent grade, and not over any basement or story below grade and not part of an accessible route.
- Fences 6 feet or less in height.
- Uncovered decks where the deck floor is 30 inches or less above grade and are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Carports (open on at least three sides and not attached to the dwelling)

Building permits **MUST** be obtained **30 days** prior to the project start date and a completed Scott Township Verification of Tax Payments form **MUST** also be included in the application. Applications are available on the Scott Township website under the Code Enforcement tab. All submittals are required to include the application/building permit fee. Incomplete submittals will not be processed.

WORK THAT DOES NOT REQUIRE A PERMIT

- Window awnings that are attached to a single-family dwelling, two-family dwelling, or Group U occupancy structure, are supported by an exterior wall, and do not project more than 54 inches from the exterior wall.
- Movable cases, counters and partitions that are not over 5 feet 9 inches in height.
- Painting, papering, tiling, carpeting, cabinets, counter-tops and similar finish work.
- Window and door replacement that does not require structural modifications to the wall or framing.
- Prefabricated swimming pools accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling that are less than 24" deep, do not exceed 5,000 gallons and are installed entirely above grade.
- Installation of aluminum or vinyl siding onto an existing residential or an existing commercial building.
- Alterations and repairs to residential buildings which do not make structural changes or changes to means of egress.

Please note that the Allegheny County Health Department's Plumbing Division inspects and permits all new or modified residential and commercial plumbing installations to assure compliance with the Health Department's Plumbing Code. Scott Township requires proof of inspection and compliance prior to issuing any Occupancy Permits for all projects that require plumbing permits.

Garbage Collection Reminder

Please be reminded that garbage containers or garbage bags may be placed at the curb side no earlier than 5:00 pm on Sunday evening and must be removed no later than 9:00 pm on Monday evening. Garbage containers shall be stored in the rear of the property within five (5) feet of the primary structure or garage or an accessory structure, including a shed, to be out of sight when viewed from the front of the lot or street. Garbage containers may be stored in the front of the home. In such cases, garbage containers shall be concealed from view from the front of the lot or street with shrubs, trees or by other appropriate measures. Please see the Scott Township website for the 2022 garbage and recycling schedule.

PEST ALERTS

Outdoor Recommendations:

- · Avoid having a bird feeder.
- Keep outdoor grills and cooking areas clean.
- Keep firewood off the ground and as far away from structures as possible.
- Maintain at least a 2-foot space between bushes and shrubs.

Indoor Recommendations:

- Opt for garbage bins and compost containers with a top that seals tightly.
- Do not leave pet food or water out overnight.
- Repair leaky pipes.
- Maintain attic, crawl spaces, and cabinets.

Bower Hill VFD is one of 3 Fire Departments (Glendale and East Carnegie are the other departments serving Scott Township) that serve the over 17,000 Scott Township residents and businesses.

Bower Hill is a completely volunteer fire department with approximately 40 members who respond to calls for assistance from the residents and businesses, regardless the time of day.

Here are some statistics about the calendar year 2021 for Bower Hill VFD

Because of COVID19 we had to curtail many of our events, including training, the number of hours has been greatly reduced from other years.

- 1. 306 calls requesting assistance these include fires, car crashes, odor investigations and other requests. These requests average 8 members per call with most calls lasting about 2 hours so that means we volunteered 4,896 hours.
- 2. 862 total hours of training. Because of COVID19 our training had to be cancelled for several months causing a reduction in training hours. This total includes classes taken by members outside of our normal Wednesday evening in-house training.
- **3.** 5,758 hours is the total of hours donated to the Scott Township residents and businesses by our volunteers.
- **4.** These 5,758 hours do not include the countless hours spent providing public service programs for the residents and businesses of Bower Hill and other areas of Scott Township.

EQUIPMENT UPGRADES

FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT: We are continually upgrading our equipment to the standards set by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to be sure that our responding members are wearing/using the appropriate and necessary clothing/equipment. Did you know that it costs about \$12,000.00 to properly outfit a firefighter, including the breathing apparatus that they wear? The money to cover some of this equipment is received from grants and the residents and businesses by their support with the Bower Hill VFD membership drive and their donations. We are hoping this year for a grant to replace some of our breathing equipment.

HOW CAN YOU HELP US HELP YOU?

Here are some ways that you can support Bower Hill Volunteer Fire Department so that we can continue to provide fire service to the residents and businesses of Scott Township.

- 1. AMAZON PURCHASES When you purchase an item on Amazon, go to Amazon Smile at www.smile.amazon.com and enter Bower Hill's name. We will receive a donation from Amazon based on what you have purchased.
- **2. UNITED WAY** Bower Hill VFD is a member of the United Way and our United Way Donor Number is 2341
- **3. AMBULANCE MEMBERSHIP** By becoming a member of Bower Hill you can receive medically necessary ambulance transports and we will accept what your insurance carrier pays and not bill you for the balance of the ambulance transport.

We provide ambulance services and transport whether you are or are not a member of Bower Hill. If you are in a neighboring community that accepts our membership and need transport by ambulance that service will accept you as a member of that service.

- 4. DEPARTMENT MEMBERSHIP Become a member! We have several positions that you might be able to fill. Not everyone in our department is an interior firefighter. Several members provide help on the exterior of the fire ground as well. Helping with many tasks involved in fighting a fire or at an accident scene. During this past year we have added several new members to the department both Senior (over 18 years of age) and junior (ages 14-18) members. If you would like to become a member or just see what we do please contact our Recruitment Committee by phone (412-221-3497) or via email at Recruitment.bhvfd@gmail.com. If you would be interested in seeing what we do we hold (COVID restrictions) our drills on the second and third Wednesday evenings of each month beginning at 7:00 PM.
- **5. BUY A BRICK** We still have spaces in our memorial garden for additional bricks. This is a way to support Bower Hill VFD but to add to your family history in Scott Township. Please email us at bhvfd255@yahoo.com and we will send you out the information on buying a brick.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS:

- 1. PHONE CALLS Bower Hill Volunteer Fire Department DOES NOT make any phone calls to residents asking for financial support. Our only contact is by the mailings that we send in October and January regarding our membership program.
- **2. HOUSE NUMBERS** Check your house numbers and see if they are visible from the curb both night and day. This is vitally important in getting the right services to you when needed.
- **3. SMOKE ALARMS AND CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS** Please remember to change the batteries in both your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors when you change your clocks. This will insure working alarms in your home. It is recommended that you replace your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors every 7 to 10 years. There are recommended expiration dates on the detectors. If yours does not have an expiration date, then it should be replaced.
- **4. FIRE HYDRANTS** With the snows that we have experienced earlier in the season it is vitally important to keep the area around fire hydrants, clear of snow at least 36" in diameter and allowing approximately 60" on the street side of the hydrant for connection to the fire engine.

UPCOMING EVENTS

Because of COVID19 several of Bower Hill VFD's events for 2021 had to be cancelled. We are hoping to have some returning and some new events in 2022. During all of these events we will be observing the COVID19 rules and socially distancing. We are hoping to hold our Craft Fairs again(Please check our website for further information), our Golf outing is scheduled for Sunday, September 25, 2022 at the Club at Shadow Lakes, our Open House in October and Santa visiting our neighborhoods in December, as well as many of our Community Outreach Programs, including Touch-a-Truck and other programs as well as participating in the Township scheduled events.

The Department of Public Works

The mission of the Department of Public Works is to provide the residents of Scott Township with safe and well maintained transportation, recreation, sanitation and storm water infrastructures. Our maintenance services are directed towards enhancing and improving the conditions of our roads, bridges, park facilities, public buildings, and sewage conveyance systems. The department's services are augmented through contracts to repair or replace deteriorated or malfunctioning sewage assets, and an annual roadway paving project. In the spring and summer our efforts are concentrated on roads and parks maintenance as well as catch basin and sewer line cleaning. In the fall the department provides community wide leaf and branch pickup programs. In the winter the department's assets are directed towards snow and ice removal from Township streets. Currently we are working with the Township Engineer to implement a geographical information system to assist us in managing our human, material and infrastructure assets.

In the coming months the Township of Scott will provide an outline on the website for the 2022 Roadway Improvements Projects. When the construction season starts please go to the website for updates.

Snow Removal: In accordance with Ordinance #1486-01, residents are reminded that it is an offense to deposit snow or ice on a roadway. Snow pushed or blown onto a road creates a hazard to both vehicles and snow removal equipment and can interfere with water flow in ditches.

- Keep parked cars off the street during snowfalls. Snow removal crews need to be able to remove snow from the entire roadway.
- Be patient during a heavy snowfall. The snow removal plan prioritizes major roads and streets as well as hazardous intersections. The crews will clear your street as guickly as possible.
- If you notice a hazardous section of Township road, please report it to the Police Department or the Township Administration Office.

Safe Digging: What is that? - We often receive calls from residents inquiring about lines painted on the streets, curbs and grass, and marker flags stuck in the ground. The line painting and flags are placed by the Public Works Department and the public utilities companies and represent the locations of buried utility lines. In 1974 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania adopted the Underground Utility Line Protection Act (PA Act 287) to protect the public health and safety by preventing excavation or demolition work from damaging underground lines used in providing electricity, communications, gas, oil delivery, oil product delivery, sewage, water or other service. In Pennsylvania there are over 25,000 miles of underground lines and pipes. The Township alone maintains more than 50 miles of sanitary sewage lines and 25+ miles of storm water lines. The Public Utility Commission reported that there are over 6,000 incidents per year of contractors and homeowners striking and damaging buried utility lines. Many of these incidents result in injury and death and most are preventable. As a facility owner, The Township's Public Works Departments responds to every one call ticket filed in the Township by contractors, Public Utility Company and residents. Last year we marked and cleared over 900 one call tickets filed in the Township.

If you or your contractor plans to use power equipment to dig on your property make sure that you call PA One Call at 811 before you start. Digging in the marked areas should be avoided. If you smell natural gas or break a water line call 911 immediately. To find out more about PA One Call visit their website at: https://www.palcall.org/.

Dye Testing Requirements: If you are planning to sell, refinance, transfer or assign ownership of your home, you will need to have a Dye Test performed before the Township will release a Municipal No Lien Letter. The Municipal No Lien Letter is prepared by the Tax Office and certifies that Township and School District property taxes and sanitary sewer fees have been paid.

Federal, state and county regulatory agencies require local municipalities to adopt and fund plans and improvements to reduce and eventually eliminate the flow of stormwater into sanitary systems. A portion of the Townships plan is outlined in Ordinance NO. 1427-97 of 1997.

What is a Dye Test? Dye testing involves placing a non-staining water soluble dye tablet in the drain or downspout of your property and flushing it with water. The manhole located on the Township's sanitary sewer line that serves your property is then examined for the appearance of traces of dyed water. A dye test is used to verify if the gutters, driveway drains, yard drains, or other stormwater collection devices are connected to a sanitary sewer that is intended to carry raw sewage only. This type of connection is not allowed and must be fixed before the sale of a property. An approved dye test is good for two years. Refinancing requires a dye test.

How do I arrange for a Dye Test? You must contact the Township to obtain an Application and Letter of Compliance (Application). To obtain the required Application property owners must call the Compliance Officer at 412-276-5300 ext. 218 or submit an online request available at Dye Test Application | Scott Township. Once the request has been received the Compliance Officer will prepare Section 1 of the Application and provide information for Section 2 on the location (including a map) of the manhole that the plumber will monitor during the dye test. After 5 to 7 business days the property owner or a licensed plumber who will be performing the dye test may pick up the Application on the second floor of the Township Building, 301 Lindsay Rd., Carnegie PA 15106.

What is a "swale"? and why should I care? Well, if you live in an area where stormwater poses a threat to your home then you either already have a swale or could probably use one. In short a "swale" is a shallow channel with vegetation covering the side slopes and the bottom, that collect and slowly convey runoff flow to downhill discharge points. A swale differs from a drainage ditch in that it is constructed to collect and slowly release water into the surrounding landscape whereas a drainage ditch is constructed to carry water quickly away. Swales are ecofriendly and trap particulate pollutants (suspended solids and trace metals). promote infiltration, and reduce the flow velocity of stormwater runoff. The Scott Public Works Department routinely inspects and performs maintenance services on seven-teen (17) drainage swales located on Township easements. Routine inspection and maintenance are performed. It is important to consider that a thick vegetative cover is needed for swales to function properly. Usually, swales require little more than normal landscape maintenance activities such as irrigation and mowing to maintain to remove leaves, branches, and sediment buildup. If proper drainage slopes are not implemented and maintained swales can become a nuisance due to mosquito breeding in standing water. However, water standing in the swale for up to 72 hours following a storm event is normal and should be expected. The application of fertilizers and pesticides should be minimized and conducted by appropriate professionals.

If you have a drainage swale on your property, it's your responsibility to maintain it so that it functions properly. Improperly maintained drainage swales interferes with proper drainage flows that can result in property damage caused by slope failure, erosion, or excess storm-water runoff.

Auto care

Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody

- Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the

Education is essential to changing people's behavior. Signs and markers near storm drains warn residents that pollutants entering the drains will be carried untreated into a local waterbody.

Residential landscaping

Permeable Pavement—Traditional concrete and asphalt don't allow water to soak into the ground. Instead these surfaces rely on storm drains to divert unwanted water. Permeable pavement systems allow rain and snowmelt to soak through, decreasing stormwater runoff.

Rain Barrels-You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquitoproof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas

Rain Gardens and Grassy Swales-Specially

designed areas planted with native plants can provide natural places for



rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Rain from rooftop areas or paved areas can be diverted into these areas rather han into storm drains

Vegetated Filter Strips—Filter strips are areas of native grass or plants created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks up as it flows across driveways and streets.



Dirt, oil, and debris that collect in parking lots and paved areas can be washed into the storm sewer system and eventually enter local waterbodies.

- Sweep up litter and debris from sidewalks, driveways and parking lots, especially around storm drains.
- Cover grease storage and dumpsters and keep them clean to avoid leaks.
- · Report any chemical spill to the local hazardous waste cleanup team. They'll know the best way to keep spills from harming the environment.

Erosion controls that aren't maintained can cause excessive amounts of sediment and debris to be carried into the stormwater system. Construction vehicles can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater and deposited into local waterbodies.

- Divert stormwater away from disturbed or exposed areas of the construction site
- Install silt fences, vehicle mud removal areas, vegetative cover, and other sediment and erosion controls and properly maintain them, especially after rainstorms.
- Prevent soil erosion by minimizing disturbed areas during construction projects, and seed and mulch bare areas as soon as possible.






Lack of vegetation on streambanks can lead to erosion. Overgrazed pastures can also contribute excessive amounts of sediment to local waterbodies. Excess fertilizers and pesticides can poison aquatic animals and lead to destructive algae blooms. Livestock in streams can contaminate waterways with bacteria, making them unsafe for human contact.

- Keep livestock away from streambanks and provide them a water source away from waterbodies
- Store and apply manure away from waterbodies and in accordance with a nutrient management plan
- Vegetate riparian areas along waterways
- Rotate animal grazing to prevent soil erosion in fields.
- Apply fertilizers and pesticides according to label instructions to save money and minimize pollution.



Uncovered fueling stations allow spills to be washed into storm drains. Cars waiting to be repaired can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater.

- Clean up spills immediately and properly dispose of cleanup material
- Provide cover over fueling stations and design or retrofit facilities for spill
- Properly maintain fleet vehicles to prevent oil, gas, and other discharges from being washed into local waterbodies.
- Install and maintain oil/water separators.





- Conduct preharvest planning to prevent erosion and lower costs.
- Use logging methods and equipment that minimize soil disturbance.
- Plan and design skid trails, yard areas, and truck access roads to minimize stream crossings and avoid disturbing the forest floor.
- Construct stream crossings so that they minimize erosion and physical changes to streams
- Expedite revegetation of cleared areas

If you like to watch birds, experience nature with a brisk walk in the woods, or just want to take your dog out for some morning exercise, the Kane Woods Nature Area located on Scrubgrass Road is the place to go. Your community provides a comprehensive solid waste program designed to encourage recycling and waste reduction, reduce litter in our neighborhoods and ensure that waste is disposed of in an environmentally responsible manner. This guide includes various services that are available to residents. Waste Management pledges to provide the high-quality service residents expect and deserve.

REGULAR CURBSIDE COLLECTION: Trash will be collected once every week on **MONDAY**. Recycling will be collected every other week, please see the calendar to identify your collection week. Place material at the curb after 6 p.m. on the prior day or before 6 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.

SERVICE INQUIRES: Residents should contact Waste Management to report a missed pick up. A representative can be reached at 1-800-866-4460 or through live chat at www.wm.com. In the event of inclement weather, visit www.wm.com/alerts for updates, delays & cancellations.

HOLIDAY SERVICE: Please reference the calendar for observed holidays.

GUIDELINES FOR COLLECTION: Residents should use their provided trash cart for collection.

- Garbage should be properly secured in your provided cart. Additional garbage beyond
 what fits in the cart can be placed in bags or additional cans alongside the cart for
 collection.
- Residents **must** fill their provided cart first before placing material outside of the cart.
- Residents are permitted 2 bulk items per week. Bulk items include chairs, tables, couches, lamps, etc.
- Additional carts can be purchased directly from Waste Management at a cost of \$85.00. To purchase an additional cart, residents should call Waste Management.
- Grass clippings and weeds should be in plastic bags.
- Furniture items, appliances, household goods and disassembled children's swing sets (cut to 4-foot length) will be accepted at curbside.
- Carpet should be rolled and tied in lengths not to exceed 48 inches so that one man can lift
- Empty paint cans and dried paint are acceptable. Paint can be dried by air drying or soaking up with newspaper or kitty litter. Lids should be left off.

EXCLUDED ITEMS:

- Building material may be picked up for a fee by contacting WM at 800-866-4460
- Hazardous Household Waste and Electronic Waste (including paint, thinners, cleaners, pesticides/herbicides, etc.) - see PA Resources Council website for county events (www.prc.org)
- Automobile parts including wheel rims and tires
- Trees, branches and bushes
- Ashes from furnaces and fireplaces
- Stones and dirt

APPLIANCES CONTAINING REFRIGERANT: The contractor will collect such items as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, water coolers, etc.; however, the item must have a sticker certifying that the refrigerant has been removed. If it does not have the sticker, it will not be picked up. It is unlawful for the contractor to dispose of these items containing refrigerant. When purchasing a new appliance, have the store dispose of the old appliance to save the cost of having the refrigerant removed.

RECYCLING SERVICE: Residents will receive every other week curbside recycling collection. Please reference the calendar to identify your service week. Recyclables should be placed loose in your provided recycling cart. Material outside of the recycling cart will not be collected.

2022 Recycling Program

We are excited to announce the acceptance of plastic tubs in your curbside recycling program. Acceptable plastic tubs have a snap on lid and hold food such as yogurt, cottage cheese, cream cheese, and butter. Food must be removed before the container can be recycled.

Waste Management is asking your community to help combat recycling contamination. For programs to be successful, all participants must make an effort to practice good recycling habits.

- No plastic bags of any kind will be accepted. Please place material loose in your recycling bin or cart.
- Make sure you are only recycling plastic bottles, jugs, jars and tubs. Any other plastic shape must go in the trash.
- Glass is no longer accepted for curbside recycling talk to your municipality about local drop off programs.
- Containers that held food should be rinsed free of food debris and liquid.
- Shredded paper is not accepted.

Recycling will be collected every-other-week. Place only the acceptable recyclables shown below together in your recycling cart or bin. (this will be updated to reflect their recycling schedule)

Please follow the Recycling Guidelines.

BATTLE AGAINST CONTAMINATION: Waste Management can leave contaminated recycling at the curb. Residents will receive a tag on their recycle bin explaining the item(s) that do not belong and further instructions. Please make sure you are recycling right!






