Questions:

1. Will there be even better rates to use the pool for Scott residents (the taxpayers are paying for it, after all)!

The rate will remain the same and residents will continue to receive better rates to use the pool than a non-resident with discounted rates for daily admission and pool passes.

2. When will we stop giving outsiders free park rentals?

The board does not approve donations of park facilities to agencies outside of the Township that in no way benefit our residents. The donation policy regarding the donation of park facilities states that requests for Community Room, Lodge, Shelters, and Amphitheatre must be made in writing, on an organization letterhead, and received in the Scott Township Administrative Office and the Board awards a maximum amount of ten per year. The event must be scheduled after Labor Day and before December 31. Churches located in the Township will be granted a fifty percent (50%) discount on rental of park facilities after Labor Day and before December 31. Use of the roadways in the park for walks and/or races to benefit non-profits/churches in the Township have been approved at no cost.

3. How will families keep small children and others protection from the sun? The shelter space has been taken away.

The shade structures are going to be up for the pool season as they have been in past years.

4. Is our library ever going to expand?

We donate to the library and offer space to them. We continue to look for space for them to possibly expand in our building. However, space is very limited.

5. Has anyone applied for the pool manager position?

We received an application for pool manager. He was interviewed this past Tuesday and was hired. He comes with a plethora of experience and certifications to operate a pool of our size. His name is Benon Brewer and he will be starting his new position here at the Township in two weeks. He comes highly recommended by our former pool manager, John Nemeth.

We would like to know the exact amount that has been spent on the splash pad and how much more it will cost to complete it.

Rosario Scumaci

I would like to know why the engineering fee for the Splash Pad so far is 12% of the contract and the industry standard is between 5 and 8%?

Projects in this industry vary enormously in terms of cost makeup, but generally engineering costs somewhere between 10% and 20% of the total installed cost (TIC). Our normal engineering costs on projects in the Township run at around 11%.

Why are we hiring a full time IT person now when his contract is good until December? You say we are saving \$7,000 I would to see where the savings are.

Retired Police Officers (which Mr. Stoker is) receives Health Insurance until they are eligible for medicare. Retiree medical costs are \$36,024. Employee Health Care costs are \$25,175 resulting in a reduced healthcare cost of \$10,849, deducting \$3,379.50 for Township taxes, short term disability, and unemployment gives us a final savings cost of \$7,470. The IT Director also agreed to reduce his vacation and the savings of \$7,470 does not account for this additional savings in time. Given both scenarios are virtually the same except for saving taxpayers money, it only makes sense to pick the scenario to saving taxpayer money.
