SCOTT TOWNSHIP POLICE DEPARTMENT INTRODUCES CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY

What is the Citizen's Police Academy?

The Citizen's Police Academy is an immersive experience that invites community members to learn how their police department operates, why certain procedures exist, and how officers work every day to keep the Township safe. Participants will engage with officers, observe demonstrations, and take part in interactive activities that highlight core law enforcement functions.

Who can apply?

To ensure a safe and productive learning environment, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Be at least 18 years of age
- Be a resident or business representative within the Township
- Have a clear criminal background

When is it available?

Applications will be available on the Township website and at the Police Department front desk beginning in the spring of 2026. The academy is scheduled to begin in the fall of 2026.

What Will Participants Learn?

The curriculum is designed to be educational, engaging, and enjoyable. Some of the topics planned for the academy include:

- Crime Scene Processing** Learn how officers secure scenes, gather evidence, and document critical details.
- Fingerprinting Techniques** Try your hand at the same methods used in real investigations.
- Financial Crimes** Understand how fraud, identity theft, and related offenses are investigated.
- Traffic Law & Traffic Stops** Gain insight into traffic enforcement and participate in mock traffic stop scenarios.
- Firearms Safety** Learn foundational safety principles and best practices.
- Use of Force & Defensive Tactics** Explore how officers are trained to make safe, appropriate decisions in dynamic situations.
- Scenario-Based Training** Put your knowledge to work in controlled, realistic situations designed to enhance understanding of police decision-making.




Dear Scott Township Residents,

In this year’s newsletter, I would like to share important information on staying safe from scams and highlight two exciting developments that will strengthen communication and support services within Scott Township.

 **Staying Alert: Common Scams Targeting Our Community**

Scammers continue to adapt their tactics, often preying on urgency, fear, or trust. Staying informed is one of the most effective ways to protect yourself and your loved ones. Some of the most common scams we continue to see include:


 **Impersonation Scams**-Scammers may pose as representatives from government agencies, utility companies, financial institutions, or even law enforcement. These contacts often involve threats such as arrest, fines, or service interruptions to pressure victims into sending money or sharing personal information.

Tip- Legitimate organizations will not demand immediate payment or sensitive information over the phone, by email, or through text messages. If you are contacted, take time to verify the claim by reaching out directly to the organization using official contact information.

 **Online Shopping and Marketplace Scams-**

Fraudulent websites and social media ads may advertise deeply discounted products that never arrive or turn out to be counterfeit.

Tip: Research unfamiliar sellers, look for reviews, verify contact information, and use secure payment methods such as credit cards that offer fraud protection.

 **Romance and Relationship Scams**-These scams often begin through online interactions and develop over time. Once trust is established, the scammer requests money for emergencies, travel expenses, or financial hardships.

Tip: Be cautious of anyone you have not met in person who asks for money, gift cards, or wire transfers. If something feels suspicious, trust your instincts and talk with someone you trust. If you believe you have been targeted or victimized by a scam, please contact the Scott Township Police Department. Even attempted scams should be reported, as they help identify trends and protect others.

 **Expanding Communication Through Crimewatch**

In 2026, residents can expect increased engagement and more timely information from the Police Department through a new partnership with **Crimewatch**. This platform will allow us to share important updates more efficiently with residents and local media, including:

- Public safety alerts and crime prevention information
- Ongoing incident updates when appropriate
- Community events and department initiatives
- Requests for assistance or information when needed

Crimewatch will enhance our ability to keep the community informed in real time while improving transparency and outreach. We encourage residents to take advantage of this resource to stay connected and informed.

Investing in Community Wellness: Police Social Worker Grant

After five painstaking years of working to launch this initiative, the Police Administration is proud to announce that Scott Township has received a grant from the **Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD)** to fund the creation of a **Police Social Worker** position within the township. This initiative represents a significant investment in the well-being of our community. The Police Social Worker will work alongside officers to assist individuals and families experiencing mental health crises, substance use challenges, domestic issues, homelessness, and other complex social situations.

The presence of a Police Social Worker will allow officers to focus on public safety while ensuring residents receive appropriate support, resources, and follow-up care. This approach improves outcomes for individuals in crisis, reduces repeat calls for service, and strengthens partnerships with local service providers. We believe this program will have a lasting, positive impact on Scott Township by addressing challenges proactively and compassionately.

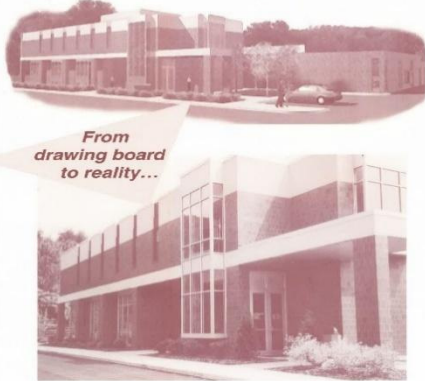

RoadAI: How Public Works Uses Latest Tech

AI, like local government, is heavily relied on. One might find themselves using AI to prepare a meal and then use local roads to get to the store for ingredients. One might not even consider how one of these services could help the other. However, Scott Township has found a way to use AI to maintain its thirty-nine miles of residential and collector roads.

RoadAI is a smartphone app that records and evaluates roads and other details such as road signs and paint markings on the road. It identifies the pavement conditions using the same methodology that engineers use to assess the conditions of road. The AI application generates reports identifying the sections of the road in need of replacement.

Tom Kelley, public works director, annually drives all of the township's roads. "It used to be that you would have to walk them and then make subjective observations on the conditions," he said. He added that RoadAI has made this process much quicker.

Kelley has also found that using RoadAI has made the process much more objective. "You don't get conflicting opinions," he said, as RoadAI can capture details that people can miss.

After evaluating the roads with Township Engineer Marie Hartman, Tom presents these issues to the Public Works Committee to help determine the repairs needed for the township.

Because of harsh weather conditions, heavy traffic and age, Western PA roads are very challenging to maintain, and Scott Township is always looking for better ways to approach this challenge.

Offering Woodland Trails and Lovely Natural Venues—Close to Home!

Nestled in the hills of Scott Township is a wonderful, woody escape from the bustle of suburban life. Kane Woods Nature Area on Scrubgrass Road offers a series of intersecting trails in varying levels of difficulty. Relatively level paths crisscross small creeks and pass through scenic forests, while more challenging, steeper paths traverse hillsides. If you choose to visit, you'll likely spy birds and wildlife, native plants and trees, and neighborhood folks enjoying the outdoors—often with a dog! Nearly 80 acres of nature preserve are available to enjoy. Scott Conservancy members and volunteers maintain the entire property, keeping it attractive and accessible.

Three parking lots are available for visitors: An upper, large lot can be reached via the Whiskey Point Trailhead located at 1501 Main Street, where Main Street meets Scrubgrass Road, near the Veteran's Memorial Bridge. The most popular parking lot is the Scrubgrass Run Trailhead at 1459 Scrubgrass Road; another option is the Jewish Community Center parking lot on Kane Blvd. All three areas provide access to the trail network.

Since Scott Conservancy is managed entirely by volunteers, there is no paid staff, and all fundraising is done by members in true grassroots fashion. Money raised by donations is invested back into the properties to improve the Kane Woods Nature Area and keep trails clear and safe. We maintain an apiary near Providence Point, and sell our local, raw honey as a fundraiser. Additionally, we hold an Annual Ducky Race 50/50 Raffle at Scott Pool on Independence Day as our biggest fundraiser of the year.

For more than 35 years, the Scott Conservancy has been supported by mostly local residents who love Scott Township and its undeveloped natural areas. In addition to Kane Woods, the Conservancy also maintains part of the traffic island at the intersection of Cochran and Greentree Roads. Scott Conservancy members give their time and efforts in both locations, simply for the benefit of our community. But it's not all work for members and volunteers—we have fun events like potluck picnics, bonfires, birdwatching hikes, and more! Members receive emails about upcoming events as well as quarterly newsletters with local interest stories and can help to sell honey at local special occasions such as Scott Township Octoberfest, Scott Library Vendor Fairs, Bridgeville Days, and Mt. Lebanon's Earth Day.

We invite you to come see our trails at the Kane Woods Nature Area and hope you will consider volunteering with the Scott Conservancy or supporting us financially through donations or membership. You can play a role in our mission of preserving Scott Township's green space!

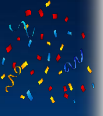

CODE ENFORCEMENT IS CRUCIAL!

NOT ONLY DOES CODE ENFORCEMENT HELP PROTECT PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY, BUT IT ALSO HELPS KEEP PROPERTY VALUES UP!

By addressing unsafe buildings, illegal occupancy, or hazardous conditions early, the township reduces risks to residents, first responders, and neighboring properties. By ensuring this as well as preventing blight and deterioration, this also in turn protects homeowner's investments. Here's what you need to know:



JUNK ON YOUR PROPERTY: It is unlawful to have unsightly debris or junk in your yard or around your property. It is also illegal to have an unregistered or uninspected vehicle on your property. Regularly

sweep sidewalks to ensure the safety of pedestrians.

RENTAL PROPERTY INSPECTIONS: Owners of all rental properties are required to obtain a rental occupancy permit prior to a new tenant moving in. An annual tenant certification is required for all rental property in the Township.

WORK REQUIRING A ZONING PERMIT, BUT NOT A BUILDING PERMIT:

- One-story detached accessory structures used as tool and storage sheds, greenhouses, playhouses, detached private garage and similar uses, provided the floor area does not exceed 1000 square ft, and they are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Retaining walls four feet or less in height, measured from the lowest level of grade to the top of the wall, unless supporting a surcharge (such as, but not limited to, a slope, driveway, patio or swimming pool) or impounding Class I, II or IIIA liquids.
- Sidewalks, parking pads, patios, and driveways no more than 30 inches above adjacent grade, and

not over any basement or story below grade and not part of an accessible route.

- Fences 6 feet or less in height. Uncovered decks where the deck floor is 30 inches or less above grade and are accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling.
- Carports (open on at least three sides and not attached to the dwelling).

WORK THAT DOES NOT REQUIRE A PERMIT:

- Window awnings that are attached to a single-family dwelling, two-family dwelling, or Group U occupancy structure (utility structure), are supported by an exterior wall, and do not project more than 54 inches from the exterior wall.
- Movable cases, counters and partitions that are not over 5 feet 9 inches in height.
- Painting, papering, tiling, carpeting, cabinets, counter-tops and similar finish work.
- Window and door replacement that does not require structural modifications to the wall or framing.
- Prefabricated swimming pools accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling that are less than 24" deep and are installed entirely above grade.
- Installation of aluminum or vinyl siding on an existing residential or an existing commercial building. Alterations and repairs to residential buildings which do not make structural changes or changes to means of egress.

Parking Pads & Driveways: All parking pads and driveways must have a valid permit and must be constructed using either concrete, asphalt, or an approved hard surface. Scott Township does not permit gravel parking pads, gravel driveways, parking pads parallel with the roadway, **OR PARKING IN THE LAWN AREA.**

Construction bags or dumpsters can be placed on your property for clean up or a construction project for a maximum of **3 days** (or for a maximum of 30 days when a building permit is issued). PODS are a convenient way to pack your belongings for storage elsewhere. PODS are also permitted to remain on your property for a maximum of **3 days** (or for a maximum of 30 days when a building permit is issued). You cannot use trailers for storage on your property. **Bags, Dumpsters, or PODS are not permitted in any roadway area.**

PEST ALERTS: INDOOR TIPS

- Avoid having a bird feeder.
- Keep outdoor grills and cooking areas clean.
- Keep firewood off the ground and as far away from structures as possible.
- Maintain at least a 2-foot space between bushes and shrubs.
- Clean up after your dog daily.
- Avoid keeping compost mounds or debris piles.

PEST ALERTS: OUTDOOR TIPS

- Opt for garbage bins and compost containers with a top that seals tightly.
- Do not leave pet food or water out overnight.
- Repair leaky pipes.
- Maintain attic, crawl spaces, and cabinets.

GARBAGE CANS AND TRASH-OUT OF SIGHT!

Keeping our neighborhoods looking their best is a community effort. Ordinances No. 915 & No. 1591, regulate the times when garbage and rubbish can be placed at the curb line.

Garbage and rubbish may be placed at the curb line no earlier than 5:00 PM on the day prior to the date that collection is scheduled at your address. All empty containers must be removed no later than 9:00 PM on the day collection is scheduled. The emptied containers must be removed from the curb line and placed at their normal **(Out of Sight)** storage place at all other times.

The Township requires all garbage containers to be stored at the rear of the property and be located within five (5) feet of the primary structure, the garage or an accessory structure. If this is not possible, garbage containers may be stored at the front of the home. **In all cases, garbage containers must be concealed from sight when viewed from the front of the lot or street.** This can be accomplished with shrubs, trees or other appropriate measures.

We need your cooperation in order to keep our streets looking "**CAN-FREE**". Don't be a "**CAN-SEE**" neighbor.

Any person violating the provisions of these Ordinances shall, upon summary conviction, be fined in any amount of not less than Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) and not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), plus costs of prosecution. Help beautify our neighborhood by adhering to these Ordinances. Trash will be collected once every week on Monday and recycling will be collected every-other-week. To identify your recycling collection schedule, please visit www.wm.com. Click on "Schedule and ETA" at the top of the page and enter your address to continue.

Automated Trash Collection

- Residents must use the provided 96-gallon cart for trash collection. Place your cart at the curb after 6:00 p.m. the night before your scheduled collection or by 6:00 a.m. on your service day.
- WM will only collect material that fits inside your provided cart(s). Additional carts can be purchased for an annual fee. To request an additional cart, residents must contact WM at 800-866-4460 or visit www.wm.com and click "Support" at the top of the page. Select "Continue as Guest," enter your address, and follow the prompts to submit a request.
- WM will collect two bulk items once a month during the first full week of the month. Acceptable bulk items can be found at www.wm.com/us/en/home/bulk-trash-pickup.
- Please make sure there are at least 3-feet between your carts and any obstacles – mailboxes, parked cars, trees, etc.

Automated Recycle Collection

- Residents should continue using their current recycling carts for collection.
- All material must be placed loose in the cart – material should not be bagged.
- Please reference the Recycle Right information for materials that are accepted for collection in your program.
